

# MUSIC SPOTLIGHT

At Nazareth, we want vibrant singing to be an integral part of our Sunday mornings. Using Spotify, these "Music Spotlights" are designed to encourage and familiarize us with the music for the upcoming weekend so that we can wholeheartedly sing as we worship together.

This coming weekend, we will sing "All Creatures of Our God and King" – a hymn credited to St. Francis of Assisi. So many stories have arisen around St. Francis of Assisi that it's difficult to separate truth from fiction, but we do know that he was born in 1182 in central Italy, the son of a wealthy silk merchant. After a scanty education, he joined the army and was captured in war. He came to Christ shortly after his release, renounced his wealth, and began traveling the countryside to preach the Gospel, live simply, and make Christ known to those he met. Drawing on Psalm 148, he wrote the poem that serves as the basis for this hymn.

Interestingly, the poem wasn't set to music as a hymn until 1919, when Rev. William H. Draper set it to a German Easter tune from 1623. In our modern day, this is why we often associate "All Creatures of Our God and King" with the Easter season. Draper brought together the text and music for a children's worship festival in Leeds, England, and it was eventually published in a "Public School Hymn Book." Today, though the words written by St. Francis of Assisi are some of the oldest used texts, the hymn appears in at least 270 hymnals across denominations worldwide.
